Community Campus Profile

The Northwest Campus (NWC) provides excellent opportunities for academic, vocational, and community education to the Bering Strait Region, with the vision of providing programs to meet students' personal and educational goals and to contribute to the success of communities.

In 1987, Northwest Community College in Nome, Alaska became a branch of the University of Alaska Fairbanks and was renamed UAF Northwest Campus. Though now affiliated with a preeminent research institution, Northwest Campus has kept its community college mission as a foremost goal. In addition to Nome, UAF Northwest Campus serves 15 Alaska Native villages in the surrounding 36,000 square miles, an area the size of the state of Indiana.

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TRANSFORMING EDUCATION TO CAREER OUTCOMES

A year after graduating, UAF Northwest program graduates (FY17 - FY21) were earning an average of \$70,304 annually, about 14 percent (\$8,735) more than they did one year before earning the certificate or degree. Program graduates (FY13 - FY17) working for 5 years were making 7 percent (\$4,624) higher wages on average than graduates who had only been working one year, showing that the earnings boost from a UAF Northwest credential increases over time.





White 38.8% Black 1.2% Asian 2.4%




PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS AND COMMUNITY IMPACT
