Exciting News: Alaska Teacher Placement is transitioning to Alaska Teachers & Personnel (AT&P)

Our new name better describes the services we provide to school districts, and our statewide partners, while removing potential misunderstandings about the word "Placement". We will not change any of our core services and will continue to innovate new and exciting ways to support teachers, students and stakeholders throughout Alaska.

A T&P continues to host the online application and job bank, where candidates apply for jobs and districts reach out to candidates directly. In addition to teacher and administrative positions, AT&P's online job bank (posts or lists) all school related jobs, such as those in the human resources, business, and facilities management offices. Updating "Placement" to Personnel" reflects the work AT&P does for job candidates and school districts. We

continue to be the foremost resource for candidates seeking employment in Alaska's schools, with our job banks, Applitrack, and other new teacher resources. And, we are still "ATP".

Place-based Education

Teacher Ambassadors Sharing Knowledge (TASK) has completed its four-year program of fostering cultural exchange between Hawaiian and rural Alaskan teachers.

ASK staff developed 29 Science, Technology, Art, and Math (STEAM) lessons focused on blending STEAM concepts and Native ways of knowing. To complement these STEAM lessons a digital catalogue of 75 resources and a best practices document were developed. These lessons and classroom resources were designed to support teachers new to Alaska as well as veteran educators who are looking for new ideas on how to incorporate local place-based learning into their teaching.

TASK also produced 8 short career videos to help introduce students to different careers and educational training. Local professionals were interviewed about what they do for a job or career and the types of knowledge they use.

n collaboration with ABR – environmental research & services, TASK developed interactive digital maps using modern satellite imagery from and early aerial photography from the 1950s. Students and teachers will use these interactive maps of Western Oahu and the Nome region to compare community and environmental changes and learn how the landscape has changed and may further change in the future.

Alaska Statewide Mentor Project & STARR



The Alaska Statewide Mentor Project (ASMP) is a two-year program that pairs new-to-the-profession teachers with intensively trained veteran Alaskan educators. This year, 15 mentors are serving 140 new teachers in 78 schools in 70 communities of 33 Alaskan districts. Since its inception in 2004, ASMP has been invited to serve all 54 school districts in the state.

t's remarkable that despite pandemic challenges since March 2020, our mission and vision were effectively fulfilled and revealed by our data. Our job has always been to assist early career teachers in achieving their goals. Being adaptive and innovative, ASMP continued to fully support, through instructional mentoring, Alaska's valuable and vulnerable resource: our newest teachers.

Validated, research-based outcomes of ASMP include: (1) Improved quality of instruction; (2) increased teacher retention; and (3) improved student achievement.

SMP continues to innovate and improve. Under the U.S. Department of Education's Education and Innovation Research (EIR) Program, the STARR grant (Supporting Teachers Across Rural Remote Regions) seeks to expand ASMP's validated mentoring model by combining distance communication technologies with on-site mentoring.

hese outcomes will allow ASMP to serve even more new teachers across the state while

being as cost-effective as possible and improving long-term sustainability.

The STARR grant also examines how culturally-responsive teaching facilitates social emotional learning for students in remote rural schools that serve largely Alaska Native communities. Cultural specialists Martha Gould-Lehe and ASMP consultant Dr. Janice Littlebear are guiding mentors to examine cultural competency, its mindsets, and effective practices. ASMP is anchored in the Alaska Cultural Standards for Educators.



We've experienced overwhelming interest this year with over 200 students registered to attend. Participants will compete in performance-
