#### **HELPING STUDENTS REACH THEIR GOALS**

**1,255** Students took at least one for-credit course

265 Students took at least one non-credit course

A year after graduating, UAS Ketchikan program graduates (FY17 - FY21) were earning an average of \$31,182 annually, about 9 percent (\$2,582) more than they did one year before earning the certificate or degree. Program graduates (FY13 - FY17) working for 5 years were making 73 percent (\$22,724) higher wages on average than graduates who had only been working one year, showing that the earnings boost from a UAS Ketchikan credential increases over time.





### **ENROLLMENT PROFILE**



#### **Qualified Member of the Engine Department**

The UAS Ketchikan Qualified Member of the Engine Department (QMED) course of study is a US Coast Guard approved sequence of courses. Earning this credential has significant advantages for those seeking entry into the Maritime field enabling them to secure employment in engine rooms on large maritime vessels. Successful completion of the QMED reduces the required sea service from 180 days to 120. The Maritime Training Center also offers 17 above deck US Coast Guard approved courses leading to Occupational Endorsements and Associate of Applied Science degrees.
